

MEMORANDUM FOR THE NATIONAL SECURITY ADVISOR TO THE PRESIDENT Subject: Draft of Revised NSDD 32 (S)

1. (U) The Joint Chiefs of Staff have reviewed the draft revision of NSDD 32 and are pleased that the draft incorporates many of the recommendations they made during the NSDD 32 review. They are also pleased to find that the document's size has been greatly reduced, while retaining most of the essential policy and strategy guidance necessary to formulate a coherent military strategy. However, in two areas the deletion of guidance previously found in NSDD 32 could be perceived as a policy shift and, therefore, requires additional clarification.



Dear Mr. Burr:

We have coordinated a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) review of the enclosed document in consultation with the Joint Staff (JS) and National Security Council (NSC). OSD and NSC have no objection to declassification in full. Flowever, Mr. Mark Patrick (JS, Chief, Information Management Division) in his capacity as Initial Denial Authority has declassified the document in part. JS-excised information is exempt from declassification pursuant to FOIA. 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(1): Executive Order (E.O.) 13526 § 3.3(b)(1).(5).(6).

- FOIA, 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(1) protects from disclosure information that has been deemed classified "under criteria established by an Executive order to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy" and is "in fact properly classified pursuant to such Executive order."
  - E.O. 13526, section 3.3(b)(1) protects information that could be expected to reveal the identity of a confidential human source, a human intelligence source, a relationship with an intelligence or security service of a foreign government or international organization, or a nonhuman intelligence source; or impair the effectiveness of an intelligence method currently in use, available for use, or under development.
  - E.O. 13526, section 3.3(b)(5) protects information that could be expected to reveal formally named or numbered U.S. military war plans that remain in effect, or reveal operational or tactical elements of prior plans that are contained in such active plans.
  - E.O. 13526, section 3.3(b)(6) protects foreign government information that would cause serious harm to relations between the United States and a foreign government, or to ongoing diplomatic activities of the United States.



If you are not satisfied with this action, you may appeal to the Director of Administration and Management. Office of the Secretary of Defense. Letters of appeal should be sent to the following address:

A written appeal must be filed within 60 days explaining the rationale for reversal of the decision. Reference should be made to OSD MDR Case 14-M-1070, OFOI Case No. 05-F-1534, and National Security Archives Case No. 20050497DOD038 and should be clearly marked "Freedom of Information Act Appeal."
